I. John Fitzgerald May 29, 1917–November 23, 1963 November 25, 1963

The masses march in their white shirts and dark ties numbed by the drum thrum thrum.

The mother motions, and the toddler salutes with the men around him.

And he doesn't understand — as the horses plod in step and the wagon rolls on and the flag rolls on and the coffin rolls on — that he'll never know his father.

II. George William May 27, 1927–August 31, 1951

Between the white wooden pier and beam house and the alley before the levy, Alton tended his Louisiana garden, grape vines, and bee hives as he learned to do as an Alabama farm boy.

Indoors he listened to the radio's South Korean war news for hints on the status of a younger brother,

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a First Lieutenant in the 15th Artillery Battalion, 2nd Infantry Division.

The telegram came years before the remains: Willie's daughter would never know her father, prisoner of war.

Alton Richard
June 4, 1918—September 16, 1973
Nearly seven decades later
hands muddied
by turnips newly unearthed,
Alton's son recalls his six-year-old days
when the radio broadcasts and
the telegram and the funeral were among
what mattered to his dad.

The echo of the losses resounded:

Brother... Uncle...

Father....

all too swift to the grave.

Alton Sr.'s transplanted roots held fast and yielded fresh harvests tended by his son, my father.

Year after year,
Alton Jr. erected memorials
Father...
Brother... Uncle...
Father...
bequeathing the paternal line's love of the land and passions for hunting and fishing.

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New Red River property
reverberates
the Alabama farm names:
duck blinds known as
Trade, Craven Hole, Middle Hole, and Bluff Hole.
And the names of deer stands there
announce the legacy:
Josie and Si.
